### NEWS FROM CORBET CLARK, INTERIM HEAD OF UPPER SCHOOL



I write this as we are having classes on a "makeup" day for our losses to winter weather. This is the first of five days in Upper School that were originally scheduled to be days off for students that are now school days. The next three are in April: a reminder that we return to regular classes on Monday, April 3rd (instead of the 4th) and that we will have regular class days on April 14th and 17th. (We gain back the final day by having Upper School meet on Friday, June 16th. You will get an updated schedule for the final week of school soon.)

Another reminder about the calendar: Winterim in Upper School runs from Thursday, March 16th through Thursday March 23rd. Completion of Winterim courses is required for graduation credit, and any absences from Winterim may require students to do makeup work in order to get credit. If that occurs, students are responsible for making arrangements with their Winterim instructors.

Underclassmen are beginning the pre-registration process for elective courses in various departments, which helps us determine the exact lineup of courses and sections for next year. The actual forecasting process for course signup for next year will begin after we get back from break. Encourage your students to give careful thought to elective choices for next year.

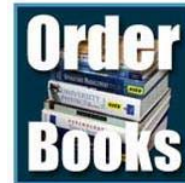

### FROM COLONY TO COUNTRY: SUMMER TRIP WITH RON SILVER

Ron Silver, historian extraordinaire and famed Winterim guide, is leading a summer trip to Boston and Philadelphia. Please e-mail [Kati Stenstrom](#) to sign-up.

**Dates:** June 20-28, 2017

**Cost:** \$1300-\$1500 per person based on double occupancy. **Cost includes meals but does not include airfare.**

**Participants:** Open to parents with students (entering 9th grade or older) and to students entering 10th grade or above without parents. 12 participants only.

**Course instructors:** Ron Silver, Colleen Shoemaker

**Description:** This trip is a chance to explore the events and factors that changed 13 independent colonies into the United States of America. We'll use Boston and Philadelphia as the base to experience how we went from content subjects of a far away King to revolutionaries wanting our own government. In the Boston area we'll spend two days walking the Freedom Trail, reliving the Boston Massacre, the Boston Tea Party, the start of Paul Revere's ride (with William Dawes as well) and look at Colonial life. We'll wrestle with the conflicts of John and Sam Adams, James Otis and John Hancock, all wanting revolution, and Governor Hutchinson and General Gage, good men, who wanted order and the status quo. We'll spend one day at Lexington Green where "the shot heard round the world" was fired and then on to Concord to the "rude bridge that arched the April flood", as the Regulars first realized the rabble would shoot back, and not back down. After that we'll travel via high speed Acela train to Philadelphia, where both the Declaration of Independence and the United States Constitution were authored. We'll go to Carpenter's Hall, where the First Continental Congress met, Independence Hall where our government was created, as well as other buildings that served as the nation's capital before the establishment of Washington, D.C. We'll also spend a day at Valley Forge to fully appreciate the experience and sacrifice of the Revolutionary War soldier.

**Travel:** In an effort to accommodate family summer travel plans, the trip group will meet in Boston on the evening of June 20. Students traveling without a parent will be welcome to travel one or both directions with trip leader Ron Silver, flying into Boston and out of Philadelphia.

**(UPDATED) COLLEGE COUNSELING**

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**AP Exams**

It is time to register for **AP Exams**, which take place from May 1-12 during the school day at OES. Those of you planning on registering need to print out and complete the registration form and give it to Kim or Paula in the college counseling office (in the library) by **Wednesday, March 15**. **Students in AP courses will also be reminded about registration by your teacher.** Extra forms are available on the bulletin board outside the College Counseling office.

Due to Mt. Hood Climb Service Day on May 10, we will be offering the late testing date (5/17) for the **English Language and Composition Exam**.

We generally don't give AP Exams that are not listed on the registration form, due to limited space and proctors.

Please use **one form** to register for any and all exams that you intend to take.

Read the instructions carefully and make sure that you indicate any and all AP exams that you intend to take. You will need a parent signature (Deri, Brad, or Peter if you live in the dorms). If you are taking more than three exams or exams for which you are not in an AP course, you will need permission from the appropriate people (see instructions on AP form).

If you are in doubt as to whether or not you should take an AP exam, please talk with the appropriate teacher and Paula Sutton (college counselor).

If you are in doubt about taking an exam, it is better to sign up now and cancel in early April (full refund) or cancel closer to the exam (you will be refunded all but \$15 of the \$93 fee).

**9th Grade Parent Night—College Admissions and Finding Balance in a College Prep School**

**Monday, March 20 @ 7:00-8:30 pm** in the Great Hall

Please join us for an evening presentation regarding what parents of freshmen need to know about college admissions. As your child makes choices about academics and extracurricular activities, we want you to be well informed about how this all works in relation to college. We find that a college night early in high school helps alleviate stress, gets accurate and well-timed information into your hands, and puts you in an even better position to support your child.

**College Board Accommodations**

Since the College Board announced plans to streamline its process for students seeking accommodations starting January, 2017, parents and educators have awaited details about how these changes might facilitate access for more students. Press releases indicated students with school-based accommodations would be eligible for accommodations on these high-stakes tests. The College Board page for [students with disabilities](#) now describes what applicants can anticipate once the new system is in place. According to that page the College Board will continue to require documentation of disability and a formal learning plan, and is developing a new system for applicants from private and independent schools by March 2017. OES students with learning plans and those who actively use their in-school accommodations are likely to benefit from the College Board's shift towards accommodating a greater range of disabilities but the changes do not appear to include our international students or those with informal accommodations.
